HEALTH AND SAFETY





✤ Never leave your pet outdoors for long periods.

- * Never leave your pet alone in a car during cold weather.
- Consider a coat or sweater for your dog, and protective boots if they'll wear them. Frostbite is a hazard to pets as well as humans. The most susceptible areas for dogs are their ears, nose, tail, and paws.
- * Thoroughly clean your dog's paws, legs, and belly when he comes in from the sleet or snow. They may contain harmful chemicals like anti-freeze or ice melting products that dogs can ingest while licking.
- ※ Use pet-safe ice melting products and a protective balm like Musher's Secret[™] to protect your dog's paw pads.

During the holidays, there's often an abundance of food and a multitude of distractions, so it's not unusual for pets to be more likely to eat something they shouldn't. If that should happen, your first call should be to your veterinarian. But if one isn't available, listed below are some websites and phone numbers

with **POISON** information. Why not be proactive and take a moment to review the list of potentially harmful items that may be found in and around your home. It just may prevent an emergency trip to the vet.

TOP 10 KITCHEN DANGERS TO PETS:

(more foods plus non-kitchen items listed on websites)

- Chocolate
- Grapes, raisins, certain types of currants
- Xylitol
- Fatty table scraps
- Caffeine (e.g., coffee grounds)
- Onions, garlic, chives
- Compost
- Moldy foods
- Macadamia nuts
- Unbaked bread
